On Thursday December 3, JASM held a webinar focusing on sake cup ceramics and, for the second time, sake tasting. This event featured art historian and head of the Japanese and Korean art department at Minneapolis Institute of Art (Mia) Dr. Andreas Marks and sake expert Chris Griese from Sake Story.



Dr. Marks began the event by introducing a number of sake ceramics made by various Japanese artists including Fukumoto Fuku and Fukami Sueharu. These cups varied in size and shape. shell. There was also a large cup called a *hikidashi* piece, created by immediately pulling the clay out of the kiln when firing is complete to create its rough, unique shape.

Chris Griese led the next part of the event – the sake tasting. Mr. Griese graciously gave an introduction to each brewery and described how each



sake is unique, with a brief overview of how each were made. The first sake was Miyashita "Treasure Ship" Junmai Ginjo from Okayama City, Okayama, then Kitsukura

"Taruzake" (barrel-aged) Honjozo from Saku, Nagano, and finally Tsukinowa "Midnight Moon" Daiginjo from Morioka City, Iwate. The webinar wrapped up after a few questions were answered, ranging from the use of water to sake brewing in the US.



Thank you so much to everyone who attended, and especially Dr. Andreas Marks and Chris Griese for introducing us to the wonderful world of sake and Japanese ceramics!


We really appreciate all of your hard work and support for JASM! Without the help of volunteers, we wouldn't have been able to relocate the office and have a good start for 2021.



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Tom Haeg's Book Review



Tokyo Ueno Station; Yu Miri, Tilted Axis Press, 2020.

When I am in Tokyo, Ueno is my default neighborhood. I like the park, the train station, and the whole neighborhood. It is neat, comfortable, and convenient. It is easy to be at home there. But, after reading *Tokyo Ueno Station*, when I am next there, I will pause to observe more than what readily appears on the surface.

Station is narrated by an omniscient ghost reminiscing about the homeless in Ueno. As a social commentary, we learn about fractures in Japanese society: minorities, labor issues, suicide, class inequalities, nonsensical rituals, social rigidity, etc. Meanwhile, the ghost-narrator apologetically describes his tortured family situation growing up after World War II. While he is sorry for what he became – he, too, was homeless – he still is bent on blaming society for his misguided life, a life which is a microcosm for the rest of the homeless people in Ueno Park.

While Miri speaks truth to power, I found the book lacked transition. That is to say, it did not move well from Point A to Point B. There is no plot. Yes, I understand that there are homeless people in Japan. Yes, it is probably not completely their fault. Yes, the authorities seemingly do not have it on their agenda. But there is no call for action in the novel; it offers no significant solution for change. So, while the writing is good, the storyline just seemed static.

Others may disagree. *Station* won the National Book Award for Translated Literature and was cited by the New York Times for a Notable Book of the Year award. And Miri is a prolific author with other accredited works. But, in my opinion, the praise is just not merited this time.
