The Japan America Society of Minnesota (JASM) will award the Mondale Scholarship to select undergraduate students enrolled in Minnesota colleges and North Dakota State University who want to broaden their knowledge of Japan through a combination of study and travel. Former Ambassador Mondale continually promoted a deeper understanding of Japanese business, government, culture, and language among corporate leaders and employees in

America. JASM is proud to again have this opportunity to assist Minnesota/North Dakota students in their quest for a study experience in Japan. The scholarship program has been active since 1998.

Recap: Primavera: JASM's 50th Anniversary Harukaze Concert 2022

On Sunday, June 12 at Sundin Music Hall at Hamline University JASM hosted three Minnesota artists: cellist Jesse Nummelin, pianist Dr. Rie Tanaka, and dancer Yuki Tokuda who performed *Primavera* to kick off JASM's 50th Anniversary. Their performance was truly breathtaking to say the least. Jesse and Rie-san's cello and piano music meshed perfectly and complemented the graceful movements of Yuki-san. Each

element of the performance was in balance, and it was clear that the audience was hooked from beginning to end, clearly thirsting for just one more piece as the performance came to a close. Moreover, *Primavera* provided a special cross-cultural experience because it combined elements of western classical music with elements of Japanese tradition and culture.

The program was composed of seven pieces that varied in genre as well as style and theme. In each piece the audience was able to clearly understand the passion, emotion, and energy of the three artists. One of the themes of the performance, as explained by Rie-san, was hope. *Primavera* first came into development in fall 2020 when Rie-san and Yuki-san could not collaborate with each other in person due to COVID-19. Instead, they persevered and worked on this program via Zoom meetings. *Primavera* remained an emblem of hope for the day that they would be able to perform together. After over two years of canceled Harukaze concerts, they finally were able to do so.

Recap: Corporate Roundtable with Dr. Yukiko Naruoka, AgriPro/Syngenta



On June 8th JASM hosted Yukiko Naruoka from AgriPro/Syngenta over Zoom for a presentation on wheat breeding. Tremendously knowledgeable, and moreover, skilled at conveying information in an accessible manner, Yukiko-san gave an overview of the wheat breeding process from start to finish. JASM members and friends

were able to get a better understanding of the process that produces the wheat that is essential for the bread, noodles, desserts, etc. that we enjoy daily.

Originally from Japan, Dr. Naruoka graduated from Montana State University with a Ph.D. in plant genetics and breeding. She completed a postdoctoral assignment at Washington State University where she was involved in wheat research that focused on identifying novel disease resistant genes and


developing molecular markers for the Pacific Northwest. She has been working with Syngenta since 2016 as a spring wheat breeder developing new spring wheat cultivars in both conventional and hybrid wheat breeding programs for the Northern Plains.



In a nutshell: Wheat is essential in Japan, the United States, and throughout the world. Just think about all the delicious Japanese food that incorporates wheat - from ramen to takoyaki. To satisfy its high demand for wheat, Japan often imports wheat from foreign countries, with the US being the largest exporter of wheat to Japan. Fun fact: Over 90 percent of Japan's wheat comes from abroad with 50 percent of imports coming from the US! AgriPro/Syngenta wheat varieties have been consistently dominant in the wheat industry and particularly in the northern plains region, accounting for 30-40

percent of total market share. The northern plains (mainly North Dakota but also extending into northwest Minnesota and Montana) specializes in spring wheat, one of two types of wheat found in the US. Dr. Naruoka works as a spring wheat breeder, developing new breeds which eventually find their way to our plates. The goal of a wheat breeder as explained by

Dr. Naruoka is to "deliver producer-desired wheat varieties with greater economic returns that the industry accepts in terms of quality." She further broke down a series of sub-goals including: 1. High production yield 2. High protein



content 3. Good resistance to disease, insects, etc. 4. High quality for milling and baking. Dr. Naruoka went on to guide us through the breeding process which takes a whopping 10 years from start to finish. The breeding programs begin with a "cross" (think of it like a father and mother wheat meeting each other). This initial cross is then multiplied, tested, and continually selected for quality until a final breed emerges after 10 years. Dr. Naruoka concluded the presentation by giving us a glance at the future, particularly the development of hybrid wheat which seeks to improve economic yield and return.

We want to extend a huge thank you to Dr. Naruoka for giving us this insightful presentation on her work as a wheat breeder.



The application process consists of the completion and submission of the following items:

Application form: Google Form / PDF Form

- Official college/university transcript(s) from all institutions attended**
- 2. Cumulative GPA 3.0 or higher
- 3. Two letters of recommendation. These letters should come from a faculty member or a member of the applicant's community of residence who knows the applicant well and who can attest to the applicant's d



- 4. An essay that addresses these questions: Why do you want to study and travel in Japan? What is your goal for this experience? How do you intend to use the scholarship dollars? The essay must be no longer than two double-spaced typewritten pages.
- 5. A copy of the letter of acceptance from the intended program of study in Japan.
- 6. The selection committee will review all applications and select finalists for interviews. These interviews will be held in during late July. Applicants unable to participate in the interview process may be disqualified by the selection committee.



JAPAN ON EXHIBIT

Turn of the century Japan is the subject of a photography exhibit Aug. 14-Sept. 21 at the Minnesota Museum of Art, 305 St. Peter, St. Paul.

The collection documents the period 1854— 1905 European as well as Japanese photographers trained their lenses on Japan's landscape and people, capturing on film a culture caught between feudalism and the modern age.

The American Federation of Arts, in collaboration with the Japan House Gallery in New York, organized the collection. Curator Clark Worswick selected the 150 vintage photographs for inclusion in the exhibit, his third which focuses on Asian photography.

The collection, which is on a year long nationwide tour, opened at Japan House last December.

Members of the Japan America Society of Minnesota are invited to a special showing of the exhibit September 12. Dr. Jerry Fisher of Macalester College will talk briefly about the history of the era, following a dinner meeting co-sponsored by the Society with the St. Paul Nagasaki Sister City Committee and the museum.

Upcoming: Smart Agriculture and its Benefits (in-person event)



JASM is pleased to announce an inperson event: "Smart Agriculture and its Benefits" with Katsutoshi Mizuta at University of Minnesota Borlaug Hall on Thursday, July 28th at 6:30 pm. (Google maps)

Smart agriculture has demonstrated its great possibilities to enhance crop

productivity, economic returns, and environmental quality. The farmers use various sensors and data to optimize fertilizer application, irrigation, and soil nutrient leaching. This presentation reviews some advanced practices and technologies implemented in the US and world. A drone flight will follow to be demonstrated in a field nearby.

Katsutoshi Mizuta PhD, originally from Japan, is currently a postdoctoral researcher at the University of Minnesota Precision Agriculture Center. He is leading a multistate precision nitrogen management research project in collaboration with Purdue University. He received his BS in environmental engineering in 2014. He also received both his MS in soil and water sciences (SWS) in 2016 and his PhD in SWS (minoring in food and resource economics). He also has experience in research from a local to regional scale with cutting-edge technologies (machine learning; proximal, airborne, and satellite remote sensing) based on big data from soil, crops, biome, climate, terrain, and geology.



Tom Haeg's Book Review

The Buddha in the Attic; Julie Otsuka, Anchor Books, 2011; 129 pages.



In this historical fiction novel, we follow Japanese mail-order brides (mostly adults, some children) migrating to America from Japan at the turn of the century, romantically tethered to a dream and the word (uh, con) of for-profit Japanese marital matchmakers. These nakoudo - go-betweens - come right out of central casting. They ae nothing more than conniving racketeer labor agents preying on the vulnerable, peddling low-end, menial jobs in America. We learn about the migrants' plights, squalors, and dreams. They were confused, used, and abused. It isn't pretty, but it's real.

While *The Buddha* is billed a novel, it better resembles a serial memoir wrapped in a travelogue. And don't expect a plot because there is none. We follow our migrant women right up to World War II to see how they were affected by the forced incarcerations in West Coast camps, too. The storyline tracks their struggles against gender inequality and racial stereotypes.

Otsuka's writing style is quite distinctive, adopting a firstperson plural narration. It seems terse yet quite poetic with a unique cadence ("On the boat..."). It symbolizes revelation, defiance, and resilience. Its language is direct without obfuscation. In fact, I don't recall even a one metaphor.

The Buddha was regarded as an eagerly expected sequel to Otsuka's award-winning novel, When the Emperor was Divine. And it does not disappoint. It was a National Book Award finalist for the Best Book of the Year.

It will showcase rare and exceptional examples of robes, coats, jackets, vests, banners, rugs, and mats, made between around 1750 and 1930, including the royal dress of subtropical Okinawa, ceremonial robes of the Ainu from northern Japan and the Russian Far East, and folk traditions from throughout Japan.
